Sacrificing Children on the Altar of Greed

"They sacrificed their sons and their daughters to demons. They shed innocent blood, the blood of their sons and daughters, whom they sacrificed to the idols of Canaan." Psalm 106:37

One of the most reprehensible signs of ancient Israel's apostasy was the worship of Moloch, the god of the Canaanites. The worship of this ancient false god, mentioned by Milton in "Paradise Lost" as one of the greatest rebel angels of Satan, was marked by human sacrifice, specifically children. There is a connection between Moloch and Baal worship in ancient manuscripts. This gives a hint regarding the motivation of God's people in sacrificing their own children to Baal and Moloch. Baal was a fertility god in ancient Canaan. He was worshipped with his partner Asherah to secure his blessing on crops and herds. In other words, God's people were tempted to kill their children because they were greedy for wealth.

Of all the deadly sins, greed seems to be linked to the most base and idolatrous of all sins. In greed, the heart is made a slave to a desire for the temporal. It is the antithesis of faith which hopes and longs for the "unseen." Greed exchanges the worship of God Almighty for the desires of self.

You may ask, what does all this have to do with mission work in Africa or the reconciliation of street children? One of the most common questions we are asked after presenting Capstone Ministries is "*What causes children to run to the street*?" Many assume that there is someTHING lacking in the homes of these children that causes children to run away. Others think that because HIV-AIDS has killed so many millions of parents in Africa, children are the innocent victims of his pandemic and have no other option than to beg and steal. While these are contributing negative factors to the social problem of street children; they are not the foundational cause. The real cause is that there is someONE missing at home. A fervent love for the Lord and Savior is missing. And by extension, missing are parents who live and love their children as a true heavenly blessing. Specifically, where there is a spiritually mature, God-fearing father in the home, children do not run away.

Recently our staff returned Frederick (not his real name) to his rural home. Fred had spent time in the Juvenile Detention Center in Kisumu. He had been picked up after spending time on the street. Our staff visit the Center every week and identify boys who can be reintegrated with their family. Fred was one of these boys. But when our staff visited the rural home, they were shocked to discover that Fred did not grow up in a typical mud and thatch house. The parents

The moringa project for Capstone has really grown over the past year. One can now buy the powder in seven different locations in Kisumu. Most recently the Ukwala Supermarket chain has placed it on their shelves along with several pharmacies.

We have approached a health food chain in Nairobi to sell it in their 23 outlets in the suburbs around Nairobi. We hope also to reach supermarkets in Kakamega, Eldoret, Webuya, Voi, Malindi, and Nairobi within the next few months.

All this is possible because of the expansion of supply. On our compound we grow about 3000 moringa trees. Most are more than 3 years old now and produce leaves year round. Three different



support groups also grow it for us. Two are HIV-Women's support groups connected to another selfhelp organization. The third is a Lutheran pastor and his congregants who have caught the vision and started planting the tree. On May 29 the Maseno Women's group called Tumaini (Hope) brought a record 99 KGs to their gathering.

Moringa income generating project is part of the 3 year strategic plan of Capstone to increase the self-sustainability of this mission. Dan and Patty will be carrying the new package of moringa with them when they visit the states this fall. We hope you will try it. were not simple subsistence farmers. The father was a successful business man with a large house on a sprawling compound. Inside the house was a large flat screen TV, a library, a large kitchen with all the modern appliances.

What was missing was not external. What was lacking was internal; a deep and abiding faith in Jesus Christ was nowhere in evidence. As a result the relationship between father and son was strained, at best. Both father and mother showed a relaxed attitude toward parenting as well. Fred didn't feel loved. So....he went looking for it. He walked away from all the signs of prosperity because something more important than the "stuff of life" was lacking.

Now certainly this family was unique. Most families we deal with have many fewer tangible blessings. But it does not change the fact that it is not the temporal blessings that bind families together, it is the love of God.

This is important in framing a mission approach in a third world country stricken with poverty. We dare not make the mistake that the "one thing needful" is more stuff. Rescuing children from the arms of Moloch means proclaiming the good news to families. It means teaching, correcting, and training in righteousness. It means caring for the true wealth that lasts to eternity.

Joel and Jen will receive some orientation with Dan and Patty for a few weeks before they fill in for four months. Like all missionaries, Joel and Jen will be raising

Street children stay at home when two important things happen: 1. The family matures spiritually, 2. The boy goes to school. With this in mind Capstone is launching a new project in which you can participate by sponsoring these two important areas of development. Called "4S – School Sponsorship and Spiritual Support Project", this project provides a way for you to be involved in these two critical areas of a boy's stability at home.

In 4S, a sponsor supports one child with a \$25 gift every month. This relatively small commitment provides:

- A school uniform for one child
- A Lutheran Catechism in Kiswahili
- A Bible in the tribal language of the child
- Ongoing spiritual and emotional support through Capstone staff visits to the family. In return, you will receive
 - A one page description of your sponsored child.
 - A recent photo suitable for framing.
 - Updates as available

<u>Join us in observing the</u> <u>World Weekend of Prayer</u>

On June 8, 9 Capstone Ministries will join with 13 Lutheran congregations and Sunday School children to observe an annual weekend of worship, prayer, teaching, games and excitement. Capstone will be observing this weekend of prayer for 8th year in partnership with the Lake Diocese of the ELCK (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya)

The weekend will take place at the Rarieda Parish just outside Kisumu. Saturday will be a day of teaching, competitive games, songs and a special showing of "The Chronicles of Narnia: The Dawn Treader".



Sunday will be a morning of worship in which children will participate with song, prayer, Scripture readings, dramas, poems and even in the sermon. The intent of the weekend is to encourage children to pray for other children in vulnerable circumstances around the world. Each year a child says a prayer for other children in Africa, Europe, Asia and the Americas. Issues such as child trafficking, child abduction, child slavery and labour, child prostitution, children living in poverty, orphans, and street children become part of the emotional prayers during this service.



We invite your congregation to join us by also praying for vulnerable children around the world on this day. When Dan and Patty visit the states in the fall, they will show the short video of this weekend to Sunday Schools and Christian Day Schools they visit.

8. Pray for the new program that gives supporters the opportunity to sponsor a boy who has been reconciled with his family. This new program, called School Sponsorship & Spiritual Support (SSSS) provides a school uniform, a Bible and Luther's Catechism and to pray regularly for the specific needs of boy in Capstone's Program.

9. Patty will return to Kenya on June 4 from a visit with family in California.

10. We will be redesigning the newsletter in the coming months. Watch for changes.

11. Some of you may remember Norman whom Capstone took to Mater Hospital for life saving open heart surgery several years ago. Norman has suffered a setback and will undergo another surgery at Mater in the coming days.
