
"SHARES" CARD HOLDERS

Missionary insights

We thought it might prove useful to describe some of the invaluable lessons we have learned about cross cultural mission work in a third world country. We write this column not suggesting we know everything; in fact one of the lessons we have learned is that once you have assumed you know everything, it is a sure sign that you know little. Cross cultural mission work is a process of learning. There is always more to learn. So here are a few items we are suggesting as food for thought for those considering supporting or becoming involved personally in mission work. Watch for this column each month as we will focus only on one or two each month.

Accountability and Stewardship

The lack of accountability is one of the great obstacles to development in most third world countries. But it is a hallmark of Capstone Ministries. Patty who is in charge of administration takes great pride in accounting for each and every dollar—or shilling—spent in country. Capstone staff knows that all expenditures must be receipted. Checks and balances have been established to be sure that there are no loopholes in the system. For example, the forging of receipts for expenditures is a common practice among those whose intent it is to simply steal funds. A clean audit from an accounting firm does not guarantee accountability. Verification of purchase, checking on purchases with the retailer, comparison of costs is part of the necessary system of checks and balances in an organization dedicated to the honest expenditure of funds. This also frees the staff from any suspicion, enhances trust and encourages honesty.

At Capstone, good stewardship of donor funds is maintained with regular financial quarterly reports to the US board. Capstone has 11 board members. Board members come from supporting churches and also serve as a liaison to their own congregations. Capstone board members are also encouraged to and have come to Kenya to see for themselves how donor funds are being spent.

A system of establishing multiple layers of accountability is critical to effective mission work. Assumptions of trust without strict measures have destroyed many a good mission objective. We have seen it time and time again. When there is a strong monitoring and evaluation system in place that assures donors that money is spent wisely and accounted for, there is trust.

Corruption of funds is the great disgrace in Kenya and most of Africa. This temptation is no respecter of persons. It is present in government, the private sector and the church. It is particularly discouraging in the church for it sends a hypocritical message to the community regarding the Gospel.

The Shares card is being changed to an e-scrip program. Savemart has made it easy for you to make this change from scanning your card. Here are the easy steps the next time you are shopping in Savemart in California or Nevada:

It's as simple as providing your phone number at checkout:

- 1. Sign up for the NEW* Shares program by registering your phone number or Save Smart Rewards Card with eScrip.
- 2. *You will no longer use your S.H.A.R.E.S. card (effective April 1, 2016). Register your phone or your Save Smart Rewards card number (this will not be your S.H.A.R.E.S. card)
- 3. Shop at Save Mart Supermarkets and provide your registered phone number or card at checkout.
